The presentation was excellent and both Jennifer and Victoria brought in their creations from the workshop! The paintings offered strong color, bold lines, and an interesting process of beginning with abstract strokes that would eventually transition into defined animals. Wow. From the results and the shared stories, it sounds like the workshop was fun!

The June general meeting was held on the 12th of the month and was the last planned general meeting before summer break. We discussed when we could gather as members and create saleable small items in preparation for our biggest fundraiser of the year - the Orchid Festival - and our Vice President, Myrtle Cassell put in perspective the accomplishments to date for Chaparral as an organization. Gallery Displays

May Exhibit - Black & White

The May exhibit at Rainbow Stew was on display from May 13th to June 14th. This member's show received a total of twenty two (22) entries from twelve (12) creators. This was the second time we've featured the theme of Black & White and we enjoyed a greater variety of creations, mediums, and number of participants. Working with the limited palette of black & white is often avoided or simply forgotten as an option when sitting down to create. For many creators, regardless of their chosen medium, color plays a significant role in the story they are conveying through their work. Removing the broad range of colors available to us can be a difficult or liberating experience. Yet the interesting aspect highlighted when removing most color is the sudden importance placed upon contrast, stroke, and placement of objects to convey an emotion. That is what we see during exhibits dedicated to black & white medium uses.

These articles have photos of the art that was on display during the show, they mention the titles of the pieces on display along with the creator, and often a general summary of the mood that the show created.

June Exhibit - Collage & Mixed Media

The June exhibit at Rainbow Stew featured collage and mixed media creations and was on display from June 17th to July 12th. This member's show received a total of nineteen (19) entries from ten

(10) creators. The theme encouraged the showcasing of creative texture uses, a mix of mediums, and the coordination of recycled materials. We enjoyed creations where unrelated objects were merged together in symmetry and emotion and the mixing of different mediums - photography, ink, acrylic, oil, watercolor, pastel, and more reminds us of textures and effects that can be included in any creation if/when we are willing to merge the strengths of multiple mediums together.

July Exhibit - Vivid & Bold

The July exhibit at Rainbow Stew featured vivid and bold creations and was on display from July 15th to August 16th. This member's show received a total of twenty seven (27) entries from eleven (11) creators. This show was beautifully represented by dramatic and bright color use and bold stroke. I was so pleased to see all the amazing creations fit together on the walls of Rainbow Stew! The show is on display for a few more days, and if you haven't gotten a chance to see it, make sure to visit the gift shop.

Chaparral Collage

Color, Color, Everywhere

I do not typically lean into real-life colors when I paint. I make excuses for why I do this that occasionally fit with the realities that painters face. In the end, I enjoy color and lots of it. When faced with

creating realistic paintings or splashing any scene with the bright blues, purples, and oranges I want to include, I would just as soon let my imagination run wild! With that said, however, I will share a few of the eccentricities faced when using the medium of watercolor that sometimes support my choice of using straight-from-the-tube colors:

- 1 Color Fade
- 2 The Spirit of the scene
- 3 Representing reflected/refracted color

Pigments are created from any number of natural and derived materials. Some of the most brilliant, long-lasting pigments used in the past were, in some fashion, highly toxic. This toxicity was a byproduct of the materials or processes used to create them. We have done our best to steer clear of such toxic pigments. Unfortunately, the tradeoff was sometimes challenging to give up - color longevity. The replacement hues for some of these classic pigments are often mere proximities that do not often hold the same vivid quality, while other mixtures are fleeting. Opera pink is often a perfect example of a fleeting color that is bold and full of light when used straight from the tube... for a time. If and when I use it, I apply a generous amount, and I allow ample time to soak deeply into the paper. The hope is that it at least soaks in through the fibers of the material, settling deep enough that the ambient light touching the finished painting will not be able to so quickly fade from the scene. Ample pigment, pure pigment, and the hope that it lasts a few more years if protected from direct light.

The spirit of your peace, of you, is one of the most important aspects of a painting. The piece itself will be lovely, and the quality of the paint, the decisions made in composition and subject matter, and the number of exciting objects play significant roles in the success of a painting. Still, as the painter, the

added emotion YOU add to a scene makes it unique and desirous. Artists develop a style, and often, that style includes the pigments they choose to utilize in their work. There are moments when you visit a gallery, and by noting the colors and technique used, you know precisely who painted the scene. Including abnormal pigments and bold strokes convey a spirit unique to the artist. For me, adding pure, unexpected color to my works conveys the emotion I felt as I experienced some moment in time.

Finally, adding color into a scene that didn't initially contain that color... But didn't it? So, this is clearly subjective, as are most of my points. However, representing a color that doesn't obviously make it into a scene can result in magic. I am pulling from reality by considering a subject's reflected and refracted light and color. Attractive colors pop out in the shadows and the highlights of many subjects. We can thank the reflected light cast off by neighboring rocks or walls hitting the sand below your subject, the subtle lichen blossoming across a surface, or that cast shadow as it appears on the ground through so many leafy greens. There are many reasons why quirky colors sneak into a scene, and they all add to my excuse for including splashes of vivid color everywhere.







Cyanotype Experience

Diana Shay Diehl of Mojave Light Studio treated Chaparral Artist participants to an introductory workshop on Cyanotype alternative photography.

As a hobbyist photographer and a watercolorist, I was very interested in this art form. Diana has a wealth of knowledge and has had fun with this creative method.

As participants, we were urged to bring items we wanted to create our scenes with - transparent to opaque objects, things with crisp and interesting edges. I was excited, and I brought a lot of natural and manufactured items like buttons, strings of beads, shells, thinly cut geodes, ribbons, and of course, feathers from molting Ravens, quail, and chickens. We were introduced to the entire process, from coating our own paper to exposing a scene using the sun, completing development by rinsing and air-drying our creations.

Cyanotype has been around since the 1800s. A photo-sensitive chemical solution is mixed, applied to a porous material like paper, and allowed to dry thoroughly. The dry solution reacts immediately to light, growing dark; objects that block the light can be placed on the coated paper, leaving the solution relatively untouched - and that is the exposure

process. The development of the image requires water to wash away the solution thoroughly from the paper. The blue areas eventually darken to a brilliant blue over several days, but Diana shared a way to speed things up.

The process was more than I had hoped for. I plan to invest in a small amount of the materials, hoping to merge my watercolor and photographic passions.

Thank you, Diana, for providing such a special visit and introductory workshop on solar printing, alternative photography, and cyanotype creations!
