8. Good use of color and shape
9. Sharp clear focus, strong edges, soft and implied edges for variety.

I also asked prior judges what they mainly looked at. There is definitely overlap! Take a look:

Judge #1, creative painting:

1. Unexpected, a surprising or evocative element.
2. The subject or topic is current and trending.
3. Use of color and composition choice to fully convey or evoke a mood
4. Demonstrates a mastery of skill or technique.

4. Excellent technique

Judge #2, creative painting:

1. Technical mastery/skill, design sensibility, unique and harmonious color schemes
2. interesting composition, clear focal point.

Judge #3, creative photography:

1. Technical skill, strong and clear use of depth of field, good composition, clarity and sharpness when required, blur when appropriate (indicating motion), personal point of view, clear focus for eye to travel through the image.
2. Use of design and shape: repetition of shapes
3. Tonal range; from whitest whites to blackest blacks, value *range* is considered in colored works.

I'll also include aspects that I've observed and deemed meritorious during my teaching experiences.

Presidents Additions:

1. Unique, authentic work that shows mastery
2. Clear use of the elements of art and design to evoke a mood or message ... (That means: elements of art: Shape, Form, (negative and positive) Space, Value, Color, Texture and Line (implied and actual).
3. Principles of design: Unity and Variety (i.e of shapes, lines, colors) Balance Symmetry and Asymmetry, Repetition, Movement, Pattern and Rhythm, Proportion and Emphasis (i.e. focal point).

*Remember that these are useful tools and not every piece will have all elements/design but they will guide your personal exploration and assessment of the final work.

Our categories for evaluating creative art and photography show a broad acceptance of exploring materials, surfaces, and techniques. I'm impressed by the mix of traditional methods and the adventurous spirit, experimentation, and innovation shown by our artists.

I encourage you to take advantage of every opportunity to share your work, whether it is within our meetings or in the supportive environment that is Rainbow Stew. Continue to tell us what you need! We all learn so much by celebrating each other's endeavors! You and your creative expression and exploration matter!! We are there for YOU and each other!

Creative Opportunities

Workshops and Paint-outs

There are numerous chances to make art in the Morongo Basin, whether by enjoying solitude, joining plein air sessions and writing opportunities, or participating in group projects, creative workshops, photography trips, and writers' groups.

Mil-Tree Writers Group meets Monday evenings, online via Zoom, 7-9pm. This writing group welcomes individuals of all writing levels and fosters a relaxed and friendly environment. The primary expectation is that members are open to providing feedback on their peers' writing, but all are encouraged to share their own written work as well. Interested in joining? Open Studio Art Workshops are offered at the Yucca Valley Community Center on Thursday mornings, 9-11:30am. Participants bring their own materials, pay a fee of \$3, and are free to work on whatever they are interested in.

Watercolor Workshops are offered at the Yucca Valley Community Center most Thursday afternoons, 1-3pm. Participants bring their own materials, pay a fee of \$5, and can work on their own watercolor projects or follow along with the instructor.

Watercolor Workshops are offered at the Center for Healthy Generations in Yucca Valley most Friday mornings, 9-11am. Participants bring their own materials, pay a fee of \$7, and can work on their own

watercolor projects or follow along with the instructor. Visit *instagram @watercolor.yv* or contact Raini to confirm workshop days.

Plein Air meetups, organized by Krista Wargo, happen in the desert almost every month and are listed on the Chaparral calendar once confirmed. Participants bring their own art supplies, prepare for weather changes, and bring enough food and water for painting outdoors. Watercolor Effects Experimentation

I've been traveling quite a bit over the past few weeks, and while I've had ample time to paint, I've mostly indulged in playful experimentation. And that's always a positive thing. It's a reminder of the importance of revisiting foundational skills each year and exploring unfamiliar techniques or effects that intrigue you but haven't yet found a place in your creative repertoire. While my chosen medium is watercolor, this principle applies to any artistic medium you work with!

In recent days, I've dedicated myself to exploring a variety of unconventional additives, tools, and methods. My aim was simply to immerse myself in the experience. Watercolor, in particular, lends itself wonderfully to experimentation, as even the most

unexpected kitchen ingredients can find their way into your artwork! Have you ever experimented with adding a few drops of cooking oil to the water before applying paint in a wet-in-wet wash? I hadn't, but the results were fascinating – the process was enjoyable, the effects were peculiar, and while the cleanup was a bit tedious, it was worth the experiment. Working with saltwater or introducing a couple of drops of bleach into the water also yielded intriguing outcomes.

While I may not integrate these unconventional additives into my future paintings, the process of discovering their effects has been invaluable. I plan to document my experiments with photographs and summarize my experiences, although I'll need to share this compilation on the website to avoid inundating this newsletter with pages of my quirky trials!

I encourage you to explore your favorite medium and set aside moments for experimentation from time to time. It's through these playful explorations that we often stumble upon new techniques or inspirations that can invigorate our artistic practice.
